My name is Ida D'Antonio-Hangen. I am a College Assistant Professor in the Criminal Justice Department. I have been at New Mexico State University (NMSU) since the Spring of 2019, but I have been a College Assistant Professor since August 2022. My email is Ida1209@nmsu.edu. I confirm that I am available to be at the Gala on May 7, 2025, if I am chosen for this award.

My Innovation: The teaching innovation that I implemented into my Forensic Law online courses was Virtual Reality (VR). This VR experience was accomplished with the assistance of the following NMSU departments: Digital Learning and Academic and Instructional Technology. They provided training and guidance in navigating VR and how to utilize the Meta Quest Oculus headset. I have taught Forensic Law since 2022. Of the 9 classes that I have taught, I have utilized VR in 6 of the 9 classes and 200 students were immersed in the learning process of this VR innovation.

My goal was to provide my online students with the same immersive learning experience as my live session students by allowing them to investigate a crime scene, and I have been successful in doing so. Through the integration of VR, students engaged in hands-on simulations that mirrored real-world forensic investigations, explored course topics such as blood spatter analysis, fingerprinting, time of death scenarios, and forensic evidence collection.

When I was assigned an online Forensic Law class, I wanted to bring experiential learning into the course, but I was not sure how to get that implemented. The following semester, NMSU was asked by Meta to test the implementation of VR into some courses. When I learned about the pilot program, I volunteered to have my class be the first to implement this immersive learning experience. Many students reported feeling more engaged and motivated to apply their knowledge to real-world scenarios, reinforcing critical thinking and problem-solving skills essential for future criminal justice professionals. The VR experience also promotes soft skills that will prepare students in the next level of their careers.

Beyond student feedback, the success of this approach was recognized externally when Meta visited the NMSU campus to interview me and my students about their experiences with VR and its impact on learning. The documentary is located at this site:

https://www.facebook.com/watch/?v=418032744007948. This recognition highlights the transformative power of immersive learning in criminal justice education. I would be happy to share insights from these interviews, as they further demonstrate how VR has enriched student learning, bridged the gap between theory and practice, and prepared students for careers in forensic investigations. In 2023, in addition to the documentary, I was recognized by Meta for being an innovator in education and was a speaker at their conference.

Currently, NMSU is testing some BodySwaps software, and I implemented some sessions from this program into my online Human Trafficking course to determine if this will be conducive to acquiring the skills needed for student's future success.

Teaching Academy Influence and other sources: I am a retired Special Agent from the Federal Bureau of Investigation, and I wanted to bring my knowledge and experience into the classroom. I took several courses at the Teaching Academy to understand how students learn best. I learned that students have different learning styles, so I wanted to incorporate all these styles into the classroom. Most importantly, I wanted to bring "real-world" experiential experiences into the classroom. The Teaching Academy courses I completed are as follows:

- Teaching 101
- Enliven Your Lecture
- Dynamic Lecturing: Finding Balance and Maximizing Student Learning
- Online Course Improvement Program (OCIP) Strategies for Online Teaching
- OCIP Course Development Institute
- Engaging Students Online using Zoom and Canvas
- Effective College Instruction ACUE (Association of College and University Educators).

I designed my classes to be inclusive of all learning styles. For this reason, I use various teaching tools like Powerpoints, videos, guest speakers, group activities, and many practical application scenarios. In my Criminal Investigation and Intelligence course, the students are assigned into groups, and they build a case throughout the semester, and at the end, they present their cases to a federal prosecutor. The prosecutor engages the students as if they are case agents, asks them questions about their case, and then provides feedback and instruction on their cases. The students undergo a "mock" crime scene to begin their cases. I have been provided the basement of Breland Hall and have set up permanent "mock" crime scenes where the students immerse themselves as investigator and process the crime scenes. The other practical activities include dusting and lifting fingerprints, casting tire and footprint impressions, learning how to interview witnesses and victims, learning how to interrogate subjects, and writing a criminal affidavit. With the help of my former law enforcement friends, they come to NMSU and act as "role players," so my students can demonstrate their proficiency of their interview and interrogation techniques.

In designing my Human Trafficking (HT) class, I wanted the students to understand what HT looks like, and not just from the textbook, but by going out into the community. I use a lot of the teaching tools mentioned above, but my goal is for the students to become passionate about fighting HT and understanding what a victim endures. I teach my students the techniques of conducting a forensic interview and have students participate in the following projects: organize a yearly HT conference, educate local businesses and ask them to place a HT poster in their business, and educate residents at the Community of Hope encampment. While at the encampment, students conduct forensic interviews of those that disclose being a victim of trafficking. This past semester, they handed out HT silicon bracelets that I created. They had the HT hotline hidden on the inside of the bracelet. The purpose was if a person was wearing the bracelet and then were victimized, they had the number to call for help. I am also an advisor for the Humans 4 Humans student group, and a lot of the students from my HT classes join the

group. Humans 4 Humans educate high school students, fraternities, sororities, and perform skits at the conferences. Due to the experience of advocating for victims of HT, many students gain a passion for wanting a career in Victim Advocacy.

During the Fall semester of 2022 through the Spring of 2023, I attended and completed the ACUE course to learn the best practices in teaching students. I used my in-person Forensic Law class to implement some of the teaching strategies that were taught in the ACUE course. One lesson I implemented was when I placed the students into groups and then every week, a different group would create the activities that related to the chapters that we covered in class. The students were assigned to teach each other during the course. Each group was provided with the props that would assist in their activities. The groups' activities consisted of comparing different blood spatter patterns, dusting fingerprints, conducting outside searches, and determine "time of death" from different crime scenes. From student comments, they loved the experiential learning and some commented that they wanted to pursue a career in Forensics.

I highlight the experiential learning in my in-person classes to demonstrate the vision I had for in my on-line courses. The implementation of VR into my online courses allowed me to accomplish this goal. The impact of this innovation has been overwhelmingly positive. Student surveys indicate that they not only enjoyed the experience but also found that it enhanced their understanding of complex forensic concepts. Many students reported feeling more engaged and motivated to apply their knowledge to real-world scenarios, reinforcing critical thinking and problem-solving skills essential for future criminal justice professionals.

Evidence of Positive Impact on the Students:


